The Federation

The Federation of the Church Schools of Shalfleet and Freshwater & Yarmouth are two primary schools both based in vibrant communities in the west of the Isle of Wight. The Federation has been in existence since 1st September 2010, has one Governing Body and one Headteacher. We have worked exceptionally closely together, successfully expanding to provide education as a full 2-11 primary school at Freshwater & Yarmouth and 0-11 at Shalfleet. We have improved and extended our buildings, developed the curriculum and further raised standards of attainment. Both schools are rated 'Good' by Ofsted. As Christian Schools, we value each child as special and unique in the sight of God and, through love, challenge and opportunities, enable them to develop as confident, caring and successful young people within our 'Safe Haven'.

Shalfleet



Shalfleet is a rural primary school, situated just outside the village of Shalfleet in the West Wight area of the Island. We have seven classes spread across the school in single year groups. The team of committed staff plan and deliver exciting learning opportunities and are dedicated to providing high quality education to our learners, allowing each pupil to reach their full potential. **Scealdan Fleot** means 'shallow water' and refers to the area around Shalfleet creek where boats could come and anchor safely. In our school, a save haven, we want every child to enjoy learning and have a sense of belonging to our school family.

Freshwater & Yarmouth



Our school is an important part of the local community. We often link with the community to enhance learning opportunities for our pupils. We strongly believe that children learn through real life experiences and actively plan these into our curriculum. We have seven classes spread across the school in single year groups. Our children are taught by committed and experienced teachers, who have high expectations for every child. Recently, the schools in the West Wight have been through a reorganisation, as a result in January 2023 Yarmouth C.E. Primary relocated to a new school building in Freshwater. Subsequently, the school was renamed to Freshwater & Yarmouth CE Primary School. The name change incorporates both communities which we serve.

Open door policy

Despite the installation of security measures for the safety of the children and staff, the school still has an 'open door' policy. We welcome parental consultation at any time. If you wish to meet staff at length, please see the staff concerned to arrange an appointment.

The attainment targets of Key Stage 1 & 2 in all subjects of the National Curriculum will be covered with each year group.



FRESHWATER & YARMOUTH'S SCHOOL DAY

General times of the day

At Freshwater & Yarmouth we open the school gates at 8.25am, children in Reception to Year 2 wait outside of the gates (closest to the school office) with their parent/carer. Children in Year 3, 4, 5 or 6 wait with their parent/carer at the gates to the rear of the school building. At 8.25am, teachers will unlock the gates to let the children in. The gates are then locked and the school secured.

8.20am - The rear gates are opened for Years 3, 4, 5 & 6
8.25am - The front gates are opened for Years R, 1 & 2
8.30am - Registration
8.35am - Lessons start
10am - Year R, KS1 playtime
10.15am - KS2 playtime
12pm - Lunch hour
1pm - End of lunch and start of afternoon lessons
2.55pm - End of day pick up for Reception Class
3pm - End of the school day, all pupils will be taken out to the playground and handed over to their parent/carer

SHALFLEET AND FRESHWATER & YARMOUTH'S UNIFORM

- White polo shirt (either with or without the school logo)
- Grey trousers/skirt/skort/shorts/pinafore (black jogging bottoms are acceptable uniform for Reception class).
- Royal blue jumper/cardigan (either with or without the school logo)
- Royal blue gingham sundress

ALL UNIFORM SHOULD BE CLEARLY

Black shoes or plain black trainers (no colour) MARKED WITH YOUR CHILD'S NAME

Additionally, each child will need a pair of named trainers, black PE shorts and a royal blue PE t-shirt (either with or without the school logo (logo PE tops available from Pendle School Shop) in a named bag. For winter children have the option of wearing tracksuit bottoms and a crew neck sweater. Children should not bring valuables to school and earrings should not be worn on PE days. The school cannot take responsibility for loss or damage to valuable items brought in.

During the summer we ask that children come to school with a sunhat and sun cream already applied. Water bottles should be brought into school each day.

SHALFLEET'S SCHOOL DAY

General morning routine

What happens at the start of our school day?

At Shalfleet we operate a very successful 'drop off' scheme every morning. From 8.10am – 8.25am parent/carers are able to pull into the school drop off area by the pavement, one of our dedicated volunteers will greet and accompany the child/ren to the playing field or classroom. At 8.25am all gates are locked and any children arriving after this time will need to report to the school office

We appreciate that for reception children first starting school, parents/carers will want to settle their child in to class and therefore we welcome parents/carers to initially bring them directly into the classroom, rather than the playground. Special arrangements will also be made for new children joining the school who are not of reception age. We do encourage older children to become independent as soon as possible, coming into school by themselves and taking responsibility for hanging up their coats and bags.

If you do not wish to use the drop off scheme, we ask that you park offsite in our carpark next to the Horse & Groom public house.

Pick up

In conjunction with the 'drop off' scheme, we also run a 'pick up' system where teachers will lead the children out to our pavilion ready to be collected by their parent/carer, our staff team will take your child to your car; the following timings apply:

3pm – Reception class singles 3.05pm – Year 1 and Year 2 singles 3.15pm – Children with siblings and taxi children 3.25pm – KS2 singles and independent leavers

Please ensure that you have informed the office by 2.30pm of any changes to pick up for your child.



LUNCHTIME ARRANGEMENTS

School dinner

All pupils eat their midday meal in the dining hall with Midday Supervisory Staff overseeing. Our cooked lunches are supplied by Chartwells and all children who choose the school meal option, have a two-course hot meal which is cooked and served on the premises. Please see the **example** menu below:



Every child in Reception Class, Year 1 and Year 2 are currently entitled to receive a Universal Free School Meal. However, this is not to be confused with the Pupil Premium entitlement that children of low-income families are entitled to. If you feel that your child is eligible for Pupil Premium, please contact the school office for more information.

For children in Years 3 to 6, the cost of the school dinner is £2.80 per day. Should you wish your child to have a school dinner, we ask that you book and pay for this using our SCOPAY online system. The school office will provide you with a letter detailing your online access code and instructions on how to register.

If you do not have access to a computer/laptop/smartphone and will find paying online difficult, please speak to the school office for alternative arrangements.

Packed lunches

Children who bring packed lunches to school are seated and supervised usually in the dining room. We encourage healthy eating and parents are asked to provide healthy packed lunches and snacks. Due to allergies, may we please ask that peanut-based products are not brought into school. We ask parents/carers to provide packed lunches in a named, plastic lunch box and an unbreakable flask or carton.

Canned drinks or fizzy bottles are not suitable, chocolate items can also melt and get very messy.

When your child starts school, we sometimes need to help them open lots of things in their lunchboxes. Please could we ask that they practice opening items by themselves.



The following items are easier to open. If we have to help them with these, we will not be putting our handson parts that will go in their mouths.



The following items are harder to open. If you send these in, please have your child practice opening it. If we help them to open the items, we are putting our hands-on parts that will go in their mouth.



If your child can open everything in their lunch, it means less time waiting with their hand up, more time eating and less germs!

Even with all staff washing their hands and disinfecting, we would like to minimise risks as much as possible.

Thank you for your help and understanding.

Sport

We aim to develop a broad and balanced physical education programme, which takes account of the needs, abilities and interests of all children. All pupils undertake at least 2 hours of PE Activity per week. Both Freshwater & Yarmouth and Shalfleet have achieved the Sainsbury's School Games Gold award for PE and extra-curricular activities.

We feel that sport is important for the development of individual potential, the promotion of good health, cooperation, team spirit, a sense of worth, enjoyment and involvement with the wider community. The Federation has a dedicated Sports Coach who ensures that ALL children enjoy and participate in an enriched sporting curriculum.

In addition to our school hall where lessons in dance, gymnastics and PE are held, we have alongside the playground a large playing field.

Sports Crew

Children in Year 6 are members of the School Sports Organising Crew (SSOC). They have a role to play in supporting sport across the school, e.g. school captain, photographers, reporters, warm-up leaders, playground sports buddies for KS1 and Reception children.

Extra- Curricular Activities

We want to foster as many talents as possible, providing enrichment for our core curriculum. A varied range of activities are offered after school.

School Trips

We encourage school trips and ensure that all year groups access a trip to the mainland each year. All trips have an educational value and tie in with our current curriculum. Trip letters are sent home to all children and we aim to give as much notice as possible. If, for any reason, the cost of the trip is causing you an issue, we ask that you contact the school office to discuss confidentially. Children in receipt of Free School Meals can apply for a discount against the cost, it is not standard practise for all FSM children to have their trips automatically paid for.

Annual residential trips provide Year 6 pupils the opportunity to experience their first trip away from home. In the past we have visited PGL, with pupils from both our Year 6 classes. The visit allows pupils to form friendships with a wider network of children prior to their transfer to secondary schools.

Educational day trips

During the school year, teachers often plan appropriate outings relating to the curriculum. These visits help children to see a real purpose for their learning within the classroom, relating it to real life events and opportunities.

Some of the places we have visited are: The SeaCity Museum, Southampton, Carisbrooke Castle, Osborne House, Blue Reef Aquarium & Beaulieu

Charging policy

There is no compulsory charge for the usual curricular activities at school. For some activities, such as school trips, the school will ask for a voluntary financial contribution in order for the activity to take place. No child will be excluded from an educational activity because the parent has not made a voluntary contribution. However, the school may have to cancel planned events if there is insufficient financial support.

Dear Parents and Carers,

The Governing Body of the Church School of Shalfleet and Freshwater & Yarmouth came into being on 1st September 2010. The schools were brought together in a Federation following a visit from a DfE independent panel to decide on the future of the schools as a result of the Local Authority's action to re-organise the schooling system from a 3 tier to a 2 tier structure. Since then we have been operating as one board, supporting the headteacher.

I believe it is of vital importance that we have a strong group of governors to help the staff deliver the best possible education for our children. Everyone has a role to play to support, encourage and challenge the team and to make decisions that need to be made in order to drive standards. I believe it is just as important that the schools should be at the centre of their community and, in my view, both schools offer exactly that in their own unique way; a friendly welcome to everyone and a warm and happy environment for our children to learn in.

Together, both schools have grown stronger over the past few years. Staff have had the benefit of sharing practices and having a wider group of colleagues to work and consult with. Pupils have had a chance to work and play at each other's schools, often meeting up with friends from the communities they live in and residential trips are undertaken together to broaden their experiences in preparation for secondary school.

The Federation has been a positive experience. We have engaged, dedicated governors who give significant time voluntarily to support both schools and are committed to offering the best education in the West Wight.

PTFA



The PTFA at Shalfleet and Freshwater & Yarmouth are both active groups, through which we bring together a combination of parents, staff, governors and other West

Wight locals, who are interested in supporting the school's and pre-schools within the community. Both PTFA's like to join forces for various activities throughout the year which bring our federated communities together.

All parents are automatically members while their children are on the school roll. Activities include a variety of fundraising events, informative evenings and generally giving assistance to the school as and when needed. The income raised is an important way of enhancing school resources, and we ask parents to support our functions as much as possible.

Pre-School

Both Little Stars (Freshwater & Yarmouth) and Little Explorers (Shalfleet) pre-schools are able to offer an excellent Foundation Curriculum and pre-school experience. Staff work closely with colleagues in the Foundation stage to develop a cohesive curriculum in line with national initiatives. We aim to provide a natural progression towards primary school by providing a safe and educationally stimulating environment for the children to develop a love of learning.

The Community

We encourage links with our local community members supporting areas of the children's learning. Pupils are involved in many local events. Our curriculum is often supported by local organisations such as local business', Town Council's and the Yarmouth Harbour Commissioners.

We hold a weekly celebration assembly in school, which parents and members of the local community are encouraged to join in our acts of worship.

Safeguarding

The governors and staff of the Federation take seriously their responsibility to promote welfare and safeguard all children entrusted in our care. We ensure that all staff are able to recognise the signs and symptoms of abuse and are aware of the school's procedures and lines of communications.

As part of our commitment we seek to provide an environment where children feel safe, secure, valued and respected, confident to talk openly and sure of being listened to. We ensure continuous development and improvement of robust safeguarding processes and procedures that promote a culture of safeguarding amongst our staff and volunteers.

We use the curriculum to provide opportunities for increasing self-awareness, self-esteem, assertiveness and decision making.

Our school Designated Safeguarding Officer is the headteacher, Mrs Elizabeth Grainger.

The Governor with the portfolio for Safeguarding is Mrs Caroline Weeks.

Inclusion

We believe that all children should be helped to achieve their potential in all areas of the curriculum. We aim for the early identification of children with learning difficulties. We work closely with recognised agencies, including the Local Authority, to ensure all pupil needs are catered for. These children will be given help as appropriate.

Curriculum

Class arrangements can vary according to the distribution of ages and numbers through the school.

The curriculum is the whole learning experience offered by the federation. It includes the planned activities and lessons organised in the classrooms and also embraces the attitudes, discipline and general ethos of the school as a community.

Based on the Christian belief of the worth of each individual, it is our intention to assist each child to acquire knowledge, skills and attitudes required for a successful life in all aspects.

A variety of teaching strategies is used to help children reach their potential. This includes whole class, small group and individual teaching. Work is differentiated according to ability. We seek to allow for all learning styles and provide every opportunity for learning outside of the classroom in real life situations.

Maths Mastery

We continue our aim to embed the Mastery approach to maths in every classroom and to foster enthusiastic and confident pupils. They will have an appreciation of both the creativity and conventions of maths and demonstrate resilience, independence and the ability to take risks and learn from theirs and others' mistakes. Our lessons will be very much embedded in the CPA (Concrete Pictorial Abstract) approach where our children will work practically and make connections as they learn.

English

Our Literacy aim is to provide all of our children with a rich and varied diet of speaking, listening, reading and writing activities that will enable them to develop enthusiasm, confidence and skill in all aspects of literacy, in order to become fully fluent and literate members of our society.

Outdoor Learning

Outdoor learning is so much more than learning outside. Through a range of activities from den building to nature watching to growing food, the children will develop our school values at the heart of everything they do. Respect for each other and the environment will be nurtured through collaborative projects that improve the outdoor provision across the curriculum. Relationships will be fostered through this collaboration and extended to include the wider community, building a sustainable future for the federation. Determination will underpin our outdoor learning through assessing and balancing risk and benefit, building resilience and encouraging perseverance. The outdoor learning provision will provide dynamic learning using available resources that draws on the curiosity of the children and helps equip them for successful learning.

Home/School Links

Home and school

The school has a Home/School Agreement which parents are invited to sign. By working together to support our children, we can ensure that they develop positive relationships, a thirst for learning and respect for others.

We welcome interest and the support of parents in all aspects of school life. We aim to keep parents informed well about their children's education so they can see it as a partnership between home and school.

It is very important to keep the school informed of any change that may affect your child. Please let us know promptly about any medical, physical or emotional difficulties which you become aware of.

Parent communications

Pupils targets are shared with parents and sent home every term. A weekly newsletter is uploaded to our website every Thursday detailing news from the school, and highlighting events. We like parents to feel welcome in the school at any time, and they may contact staff for an appointment (or vice versa) if there is any concern with a child's behaviour or progress. Your first point of contact is either the class teacher or the school office where they will direct you to the appropriate person to deal with your query.

The school has a website to keep parents updated on all curriculum issues and events. This can be accessed via <u>www.fosay.co.uk</u>. Another way of communication is via our Dojo messaging system, this is used by the teachers to keep you informed of any celebrations for behaviour and achievement. Dojo is a two way communication between home and school.

Regular consultation meetings are held to discuss pupil progress and a written report is sent to parents in the summer term.

Parental help in school

We value any help which you can give to school, whether in the classroom or helping behind the scenes. Any help you give not only benefits the school in general, it also benefits your own child. It shows them that you value the school, are a part of the school community and are interested in what is happening. These positive feelings rub off on your child. If you would like to help, either regularly or occasionally, please contact the school office.







Transport

Both of our schools are on the Southern Vectis bus route.

Freshwater & Yarmouth

Parents who bring and collect children by car can use the main public car park at Moa Place. There is a permit scheme in operation with the council, so parents are able to use the car park free of charge for up to half an hour during the beginning and end of the school day – and also at lunchtimes for preschool parents. We are very lucky to have such a facility, so parents are asked to make sure that they use the marked parking bays to ensure that their children are safe when using the car park. Cars parked outside the designated areas are likely to incur a penalty notice.

Children will be released to a collecting adult at the end of the school day, via the front and back gates. Parents are responsible for the safe conduct of their child when they leave the school premises. We ask parents not to walk through the staff car park.

Shalfleet

Parents are able to use the drop off/pick up scheme run by staff and volunteers. At the beginning of each day, you are able to drive into the school and pull up along the pavement area, a volunteer will then collect your child from your car and walk them to the playground entrance (Reception children will be walked to their classroom). At the end of each day, the children are taken by a member of staff to the pavilion. Here the children wait in line until their parent arrives at their allotted time. A member of staff will then escort your child to your car.

We also have an offsite car park next to the Horse & Groom public house. We encourage parents to use this facility should you not wish to use the drop off/pick up scheme.

Parent/carers are asked not to park on the school site during the drop off/pick up period.

Both schools require parents to inform the office if their child is being collected by another adult.



Transition

Ways to make school familiar:

- Point out the school whenever you pass it.
- Tell stories about what you enjoyed at school and the fun things you did
- Walk or drive to school together so that your child gets to know the route. Note how long it takes so you leave in plenty of time on their first day.

Plan ahead

- Shop for uniform and other equipment early if possible
- Label everything! All clothing including PE kit, book bag, lunch boxes etc.

The countdown

- If your child is in a holiday routine, staying up late and rising late, then one week before term begins, gradually change their schedule.
- Read books on 'going to school' or create your own social situation stories. Role play is a good way to familiarise your child.
- Focus on change as a good thing.
 - Develop children's independence by teaching your child to:
 - o Do up buttons and zips and put on shoes and socks
 - o Go to the toilet unaided
 - Wash and dry hand properly
 - o Share with others
 - Respect the rights and property of others
 - Put away toys and games
 - o Wait their turn
- Involve your child in getting ready for their first day.

Emotions

Your feeling will guide your child's emotions, If you approach your child's first day with confidence then they will be fine, using positive words about school, their anxieties will be reduced.

Saying goodbye at school may be very emotional for you. But please try to send your child off with a smile. Remember, even distressed children settle very quickly once you have gone, so make leaving loving but brief. If you are particularly worried, please phone the school office later to check that your child has settled.

End of the day

Do make sure that you are a little early to collect your child, even a few minutes late can seem an eternity to a waiting child. Make listening a priority, they will probably talk about their first day in their own tie so avoid pressing your child.

Questions that children may want to answer at the end of a long school day:

- 1. What did you eat for lunch?
- 2. Did you catch anyone doing something funny?
- 3. What games did you play at playtime?
- 4. What was the funniest thing that happened today?
- 5. Did anyone do anything super nice for you?



Please encourage your child to talk about their day. It makes a huge difference in improving their self-confidence and self-esteem. ¹⁶



General Information

Medical

We will always care for children who become ill at school. We have a number of trained first aiders in each school who are able to administer first aid in the event of an accident. In the case of a more serious accident, we will contact parents as soon as possible, it is important that you keep the school up to date with your contact details. It is very important that the school is informed of any known illness, allergies or conditions which may have an effect on your child's capacity to learn (e.g. hearing, sight, asthma, convulsions).

Medicines in school

If your child needs medication during the school day, please contact the school office to complete the authorisation paperwork. We are unable to administer medicine without the signed paperwork. If your child requires medicine 3 times a day, we ask that if possible this be administered around the school day. Unfortunately, we are only able to administer prescribed medicine.

All medicine should be brought directly to the school office at the beginning of the day.

If your child suffers with asthma and needs a pump in school, please ensure that we have received the relevant asthma information and an up to date pump.

Absence

Forming good patterns of attendance is a n essential part of life and can impact heavily on achievement.



All parents are expected to ensure that pupils attend school regularly and on time. School attendance is important for your child's education and therefore we urge you to try to avoid taking your holidays during term time. Holiday requests during term time will not be authorised and are recorded as such in the attendance register. Absence requests that are not deemed as 'exceptional circumstances' may face a penalty notice via the Isle of Wight County Council. Absence reporting procedure

For every day of your child's absence it is your responsibility to inform the school before 9 am that your child will not be in school. This can be done by leaving an answerphone message on the school number or via email:

Upon your child's return to school, you are required to supply in writing/email a letter explaining why your child was off school. If we do not hear from you then we try to contact you to ascertain why your child is off, until we hear from you, your child's attendance will be marked with an 'N' code (no reason yet given for absence). Once we have received communication from you, the code will be altered to 'O' (unauthorised absence). This code can only be changed to either 'I' (illness) or 'C' (circumstance) once a written explanation has been received.

We hope that this clearly explains the procedure that we are required to follow. Thank you for your support and co-operation.

General Information

Complaints

Complaints may be made under arrangements pursuant to Section 23 of the Education Reform Act 1988. Details are available from the school. However, we very much hope that any issue will be resolved through discussion with the school staff.

How to make a complaint

If you are not happy with any aspect of school life, please:

- Speak to your child's class teacher first, if it is to do with your child
- If this does not resolve the concern, speak to the lead teacher in charge.

In the unlikely event that your concerns have not been resolved, the next step is to contact the Deputy Headteacher/Headteacher. Once these avenues have been exhausted and your complaint has not been resolved your next step is to contact (in writing) our Chair of Governors, Mrs Carla Bradshaw.

If this does not resolve the concern, you should make your complaint known to the Director of Children's Services at County Hall, Newport.

Behaviour and Discipline

Encouraging good behaviour

We have high expectations, and we promote the development of self-discipline and self-esteem by:


- Providing good role models

The aim of our schools is to encourage self-discipline, courtesy, respect and consideration for others. Positive praise and encouragement underpin all that we do in school. We instil in pupils that they alone are responsible for their choices and as a result of such choices there can be consequences.

We have a reward system across the Federation for courtesy, kindness, helpfulness and academic achievement. Pupils receive stickers, certificates and credits depending on their particular year group.

A weekly worship to celebrate both academic and pastoral achievement takes place. Teachers identify pupils for academic success, against their own standards or for supreme effort, persistence with work or good social skills.
